


BLUE BOX - WHAT CAN I RECYCLE?





Human Trafficking doesn't always involve Boarders, Abduction or even Movement, it can happen right here in our very own Community. That is why we as First Nation Service Providers, People, Parents, Families and Communities we should all be made aware of just exactly what is HUMAN TRAFFICKING. It involves the Control over another Person's Life, often Minors, the average age of those who are Trafficked are 13 to 15 year old Females, and First Nation Girls are the most targeted. Especially Young Girls from Trouble and Broken Families who are experiencing turmoil and may be on the Run. Young people who are having differences with their parents (and most teens go through this at this stage that make them even more vulnerable) so the most Vulnerable, Children who are High Risk, families involved with Child and family Services—in trouble with the law and of the First Nation population are the most argeted as a result.

But this does not mean that Males or Boys are not targeted or fall victim this CRIIME, because they do and people who are older are also victimized, teenagers, women, young men, etc...are also vulnerable. HUMAN TRAFFICKING IS HERE and it is a CRIME.

KNOWLEDGE is POWER!



FEBRUARY / Magua Giizis / Bear Moon



We call this Moon the Magua Giizis because it is the Month when the Baby Bears are <u>Born</u>. It is said that the Bear Rolls Over and that is a significant Event in terms that the <u>Magua</u> signals Mid-Winter, the Bear is the one who teaches us about Medicine, the Bear was the First Medicine Person because they have a close relationship with Mother Earth and the Plants. <u>Magua</u> is also a Protector of the Natural World and brings lots of Teachings about that relationship to Mother Earth / <u>Shgaakmikwe</u>.

Nokomis <u>Giizis</u> / Grand Mother Moon influences ALL Natural Life on Earth and out into the Universe. Most times we may not be aware of her Influence, but the Natural World responds time & time again, Cycle after Cycle, the changing of the seasons, the Flow & Ebb of the Waters, the Life Cycles of all the New <u>Borns</u> and with each New Full Moon come something significant about that time of the Year.

Mainstream World follows a different Calendar, for some reason there is only 12 Months, their Calendar does not acknowledge that there are actually 13 MOONS, every 28 days the new FULL MOON shines upon us. There are actually no Full Moons in February, they both fall just before and after February. On January 31st is the beginning of the MAQUA GIIZIS / Bear Moon / FABRUARY. The next Full Moon will be Onaabadin Giizis / Snow Crust Moon / March 02 which is a Saturday and there will be a FULL MOON CREMONY here at the Shelter from 6:00 pm to 8:30 pm.
