

Chief Sayers used the opportunity to speak on challenges with the Ontario government including the local issue at Gargantua Harbour as well as Elder's safety, cultural teachings and traditional games.

AIAI look forward to celebrating the insurmountable wealth of knowledge and insight the 200 Elders in attendance have to offer throughout this week's gathering.

Greetings AIAI member Nations,

Chiefs Council has mandated the development of a position paper on tobacco and its economic impact on our Nations. To complete this work, AIAI is carrying out a **Tobacco Research and Engagement Project.**

The project involves engagement and data collection in communities, as well as research and analysis. The project is **non-binding and requires no commitment or agreement between the province and the member nations in any form.** The project also includes principles to protect the communities, which are attached to this letter.

The Tobacco Project includes a number of steps:

- 1. Community engagement and information sessions in member First Nations;
- 2. An environmental scan of existing community capacity related to the tobacco re: barriers, issues, and gaps;
- 3. An analysis of compiled data for information sharing with the communities and the development of recommendations; and
- 4. Development of an AIAI position paper to share with the province.

AlAl is in the process of hiring a Lead Researcher to facilitate this project. One **Community Liaison** per member Nations will also be hired to work closely with Lead Researcher and to garner information from his/her respective community. Postings for this position are now being sent for posting in the communities.

This project will be getting underway in the **next few weeks** and is scheduled to be completed by February 2018. We look forward to connecting with the communities in order to carry out the first steps identified.





RE: Sixties Scoop Class Actions

Our law firm is located on the Fort William First Nation near Thunder Bay, Ontario

Our office was involved early on with the Indian Residential Schools (IRS) class action. Over the past 10 years we assisted hundreds of IRS Survivors to obtain justice for the horrible mistreatment they suffered. We wish to do the same for Sixties Scoop Survivors if and when a claims process begins. Our office is not Class Counsel in any of ongoing Sixties Scoop lawsuits in Canada. Two of our lawyers—who have worked primarily to assist IRS Survivors—are Status Indians as well as the children and grandchildren of IRS Survivors. We care deeply about helping Survivors and Indigenous people generally.

The Sixties Scoop lawsuits have recently been in the news more frequently. Our office believes it is likely the Federal government will ultimately agree to settle all of the Sixties Scoop lawsuits across Canada. This is why we wish to have Sixties Scoop Survivors individually retain us now to act on their behalf in the event the Sixties Scoop lawsuits are settled. Our office feels it will be important for all Sixties Scoop Survivors to have the direct assistance of a lawyer if and when it becomes possible for them to complete an individual claim as part of a settlement process.

The purpose of our visit to your community is to provide you with a copy of our Sixties Scoop poster and business cards — with the hope that these materials can be made available to interested community members who may wish to contact us.

Thank you for taking the time to read this letter. I hope you are willing to display our poster in your community. We will likely be in your area again in the coming months, at which time we could host an information session for community members if you chose to invite us to do. We will be in touch as things progress.






