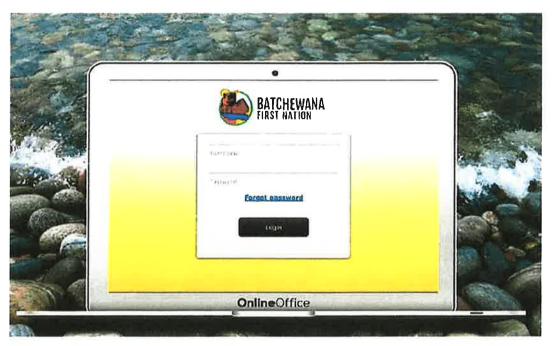

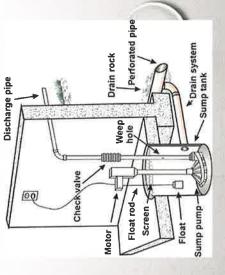

Non Dway Gamig Community Wellness Program aims to provide quality service from a holistic treatment perspective to the members of our Nation. The program provides a safe and culturally sensitive counselling to clients in all communities.

Non Dway Gamig Community Wellness Program offers and provides various types of services which include one on one counselling, external and internal referrals, addictions support, and crisis support.

Community Wellness Team includes: Community Mental Wellness, Youth Wellness, NNADAP, Community Outreach Support. Our program also includes groups for adult and youth that include Mental Health First Aid, Safe Talk, and Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training, Domestic Violence, Anger Solutions, and Grief/ Loss Support. Other programs and support services include: Community Lunches held in all communities every Thursday, Stress Management Therapy, and Elder's Luncheons held quarterly.

Mental Health Support Clinics will be held daily from Monday to Thursday from 9:00am - 4:00pm at the Batchewana Health Centre Non Dway Gamig. This service is open to all Batchewana First Nation membership and Community members (on reserve) and will include one on one sessions for counselling, intervention and support, crisis counselling from the Community Wellness Team/ Staff and other support staff from Maamwesying Mental Wellness.

Walk ins are welcome, no appointments necessary!

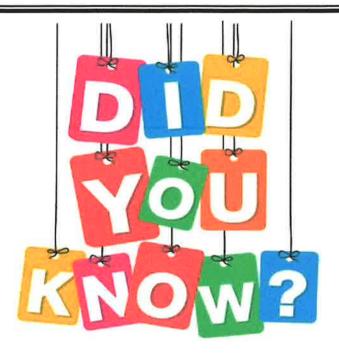

What we do

- > Support and Coordinate services.
- > Provide services to families that need help protecting and caring for their children.
- Receive and investigate reports of possible child abuse and neglect; assess child and family needs, strengths, and resources.
- > Support the well-being of children living with relatives or foster families, including ensuring that their educational needs are addressed.
- Work with the children, youth, and families to achieve family reunification.
- ➤ Honest, Transparent and honest practice.





Band Representatives are here to support with the following:

- A Band Representative provides advocacy and support to Batchewana First Nation families who are involved with the Children's Aid Society (CAS) / Nogdawindamin to ensure that the rights of our children and families are respected by the agencies.
- o The Band Representative is a legal party to proceedings that are before the Court in child protection matters on behalf of BFN and are there for the best interests of the child(ren).
- o Band Representatives are available to Batchewana First Nation members located both on-reserve and off-reserve
- o Band Representatives will ensure that at all times and according to the Child, Youth and Family Services Act, that the least intrusive measures are exercised by any CAS/NOG involved with BFN members.
- o BFN Band Representatives will seek to ensure that the child(ren) are not displaced from our strong and vibrant community.





It is important to know your rights and how Legal Aid Ontario (LAO) can help — whether you're a parent or you're a caregiver (another member of the child's family or community, such as a grandparents, aunt, uncle or sibling). If a child protection agency becomes involved with your family, you can:

NOGDAWINDAMIN IS A CHILDREN'S AID SOCICETY

- Call LAO at 1-800-668-8258 to see if you qualify for a lawyer. Even if you do not qualify for a lawyer through LAO, you can get a referral to a different service for legal advice.
- Speak to a lawyer before signing any documents
- If you are First Nation, Metis or Inuit, ask about specific sections of the *Child and Family Services Act* and Legal Aid services that apply to you and your family. You are entitled to BAND REPRESENTATION at ALL times during when in the presence of Children's Aid Society or Nogdawindamin.
- Speak to a lawyer before signing any documents
- In some cases, LOA may be able of help keep the matter outside of court by providing you with a lawyer to help negotiate customary care agreements, special needs agreements, temporary care agreements or facilitate participation in an Aboriginal alternative dispute resolution process such as Talking Together or Talking Circles.
- Ask for the child protection agency report or court documents that explain why your child was removed/or as to why there is an investigation.
- Ask for a mediator or alternative dispute resolution service to help you work out an out-of-court agreement.
- Ask for visits with your child.

- A voluntary care agreement
- A customary care agreement (an agreement for the care and supervision of a First Nation child by a person who is not the child's parent, according to the custom of the child's band or native community).
- A temporary care agreement
- Participation in an Aboriginal alternative dispute resolution process, such as Talking Together or Talking Circles.

There are three levels of Community Support Services. They are as follows:

Primary Prevention

Primary Prevention services seeks to strengthen and enhance individual, familial and community functioning. These programs initiate and maintain the strengths of First Nation communities by addressing all aspects of child well-being through ongoing education and awareness. Primary prevention can also be defined as community conditions and strengths which are created to prevent the emergence of problems. For example, a community wide family life education awareness program.

In primary prevention, programs are targeted toward the community as a whole, rather than focused on any one individual or family.

Example of primary prevention initiatives or programs include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Community education workshops and information sessions
- 2. Special promotions and activities (example: Cherish the Child Week, child Abuse Prevention Week, Honor Dinner for Elders;
- 3. Recognition of achievement (example: at the school)

Secondary Prevention

Secondary Prevention services target children, youth, adults and/or families who may be or are known to be "at risk" of developing serious difficulties without ongoing supportive interventions. To provide effective programs or initiatives, those areas or circumstances that contribute to the difficulties must be identified.

Alternative programs and services can be provided that will intervene in a crisis situation or respond to problems by using resources appropriate to the needs of the First Nation communities.

Examples of secondary prevention initiatives or program include, but are not limited to:

a) Support groups for "at risk" children, adolescents and parents, e.g. parent skill training, nutrition group for pregnant teenagers, father friendship circles;

- b) Parent support groups that focus on specific areas of difficulty. e.g. appropriate discipline methods; strategies for dealing with parent-teen conflicts.
- c) Development and implementation of strategies to combat identified concerns within the First Nation community, e.g. teen suicide, community response protocols; and,
- d) Supportive counseling and referral services.

Tertiary Prevention

Tertiary Prevention services are often referred to as "after-the-fact" intervention. The goal of tertiary intervention is to prevent a specific incident or difficulties from reoccurring. The fundamental objective of tertiary prevention is to mitigate the circumstances that have led to the difficulties. Children, adults and families are helped to develop skills which will help them cope more effectively when placed in similar stressful circumstances in the future.

Unlike primary prevention, which focuses primarily on community awareness and education and the promotion of holistic well-being, tertiary intervention strives to help children, adults and families actively incorporate healthier attitudes and better problem-solving skills into their daily living. The programs encourage and facilitate change at the individual and family levels.

Examples of tertiary prevention initiative's or programs include, but are not limited to the following:

- a) Crisis prevention;
- b) Grief counseling;
- c) Protective services and/or police intervention;
- d) Clinical assessment and treatment;
- e) Case conferencing with internal and external service providers;
- f) Out-of-home child care; and
- g) Specialized groups that focus on specific child welfare issue, e.g. adolescent survivors of sexual assault.

Note: Programs and activities most frequently offered through Community Support Services Program fall under primary and secondary prevention.





Foster parenting is a powerful way to lift up the heads of children and youth, and show them that there is hope for the future.

The difference you can make as a foster parent does not just change the one or two children you are fostering. It has the ability to change generations. Children and youth can learn what it takes for families to be stable, abuse-free, and safe.

Provide a safe, stable and nurturing home rooted in the traditions of Batchewana First Nation and values of the child's indigenous community.

Let's keep OUR children in OUR Community.

Our Children need you.
